
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Gifted at Gifts

Rife With Relatives






above: The Queen 'Bee'd line of jewelry features handmade glass beads. top: Owner Rhonda Gordon (right) and her sister Angela Leach



She adds, "Variety is what brings people to my store. It's a one-stop shop. I don't sell just one thing, like a babies' store, a ladies' store, or a jewelry store."

"I really try to know each of my customers on a personal basis," says Rhonda. "I think that's why they keep


coming back, because we do our best to treat them like they're at home." For this family, Gifts Galore practically is home.
